The theatre is located at 226 West 46th Street between Broadway
and Eighth Avenue in Manhattan.

Please note that the theatre doors
open at 12:30 p.m. The house staff will
let everyone in as soon as they are
ready to seat the audience.



Patrons may need to wait in line before passing through security.



The security team helps to make sure everyone is safe. A security dog may be part of this team. The dog will not touch patrons. The dog may bark to communicate with the security team.



Theatre staff will scan each ticket so patrons can enter the theatre. The location on each ticket corresponds to a specific seat. Once inside, an usher will let everyone know where to go.



At the theatre, TDF volunteers will be passing out fidget tools.



Patrons may use the bathroom on the way to their seats or at any time during the show.

All restrooms are Family Restrooms. Anyone may use any restroom and caretakers may provide personal assistance as required.



The theatre will become darker and quieter once the show is about to begin.

The actors wear costumes when performing. This helps them pretend to be the characters they are portraying.

Actors will not touch anyone in the audience.



The audience may clap during and at the end of the show. Clapping lets the actors know that the audience likes their performances.

If the clapping or other sounds are too loud, TDF volunteers have earplugs and noise-canceling headphones to help make it quieter.



If the show is ever too loud or too bright, Break Areas are available.

In these areas, there are beanbag chairs and mats to sit or lie on.

When ready, patrons may go back into the theatre to experience the show!



There is an intermission during the performance. This is a short break between the first and second parts of the show.

During intermission, audience members may walk into the lobby area or stay in their seats.

As intermission draws to a close, the theatre will flash the house lights to signal that it's time to return to your seat. Everyone will come back and sit down.

The theatre will become dark and quiet again. The performers will come back onstage and finish their performance of *Hamilton*.





When the performance is finished, the audience will leave the theatre. We look forward to seeing you at *Hamilton* and other TDF Autism Friendly Performances!



HISTORICAL CHARACTER INFORMATION

When two characters are listed next to an image of one actor, the performer plays both parts. Characters may be played by other performers and would then look different from the actors featured in this guide.



Alexander Hamilton was a Founding Father* who played a key role in the American Revolution and the building of a new nation. Alexander Hamilton was married to Eliza Schuyler Hamilton and had eight children. Their oldest child was Philip.



Also a Founding Father, Aaron Burr was Alexander Hamilton's rival. He served as Vice President to Thomas Jefferson and killed Alexander Hamilton in a duel.



George Washington was a general in the Revolutionary War. He became the first President of the United States.



John Laurens was Hamilton's friend.

Philip was Alexander and Eliza Hamilton's oldest son.

* Founding Fathers is a term used to describe the men who played important roles in securing the independence of the original 13 colonies from England and helped found the United States.



HISTORICAL CHARACTER INFORMATION



Marquis de Lafayette was a Frenchman and ally.

Also a Founding Father, Thomas Jefferson held many important positions, including Minister to France and Secretary of State. He disagreed with many of Hamilton's ideas. He went on to become the third President of the United States.



Hercules Mulligan was a spy for Washington.

Also a Founding Father, James Madison helped Hamilton write some important government documents and went on to become the fourth President of the United States.



Eliza Schuyler was Hamilton's wife and mother to Philip. After her husband died, she established the first private orphanage in New York City.

Angelica Schuyler, Eliza's older sister, was in love with Alexander Hamilton but married someone else.

Peggy Schuyler was the youngest sibling.



King George III was the ruler of England who didn't want the colonies to become independent.
